Pursuant to section 11A(2)(b) of the Foreign Affairs Act 1943, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

These regulations are administered by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade.

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Regulations

1 Title and commencement

- (1) These regulations may be cited as the Foreign Affairs (Legal and Notarial Fees) Regulations 1982.
- (2) These regulations shall come into force on 1 April 1982.

2 Minister may determine certain fees

The Minister may from time to time, by notice in the *Gazette*, determine the fees to be taken in respect of any of the following matters and things done in the execution of his office by an overseas representative or by an officer appointed under section 8 of the Foreign Affairs Act 1943, and the conditions upon which exemptions from or reductions of any such fees may be granted:

- (a) the taking of any affidavit, affirmation, or declaration:
- (b) the witnessing of any will or other testamentary disposition:
- (c) the certification or verification of any signature or document:
- (d) the typing or other preparation of any certificate or attestation in respect of any document:
- (e) the making and verification of a translation of any document.

**Foreign Affairs (Legal and Notarial

The regulations empower the Minister of Foreign Affairs to prescribe fees for the various matters specified in *regulation 2* where those matters are dealt with in overseas posts.

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Notes**1 *General***

This is a reprint of the Foreign Affairs (Legal and Notarial Fees) Regulations 1982. The reprint incorporates all the amendments to the regulations as at 19 March 1982, as specified in the list of amendments at the end of these notes.

Relevant provisions of any amending enactments that contain transitional, savings, or application provisions that cannot be compiled in the reprint are also included, after the principal enactment, in chronological order. For more information, see <http://www.pco.parliament.govt.nz/reprints/>.

2 *Status of reprints*

Under section 16D of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989, reprints are presumed to correctly state, as at the date of the reprint, the law enacted by the principal enactment and by the amendments to that enactment. This presumption applies even though editorial changes authorised by section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989 have been made in the reprint.

This presumption may be rebutted by producing the official volumes of statutes or statutory regulations in which the principal enactment and its amendments are contained.

3 *How reprints are prepared*

A number of editorial conventions are followed in the preparation of reprints. For example, the enacting words are not included in Acts, and provisions that are repealed or revoked

4 Changes made under section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989

Section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989 authorises the making of editorial changes in a reprint as set out in sections 17D and 17E of that Act so that, to the extent permitted, the format and style of the reprinted enactment is consistent with current legislative drafting practice. Changes that would alter the effect of the legislation are not permitted. A new format of legislation was introduced on 1 January 2000. Changes to legislative drafting style have also been made since 1997, and are ongoing. To the extent permitted by section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989, all legislation reprinted after 1 January 2000 is in the new format for legislation and reflects current drafting practice at the time of the reprint.

In outline, the editorial changes made in reprints under the authority of section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989 are set out below, and they have been applied, where relevant, in the preparation of this reprint:

- omission of unnecessary referential words (such as “of this section” and “of this Act”)
- typeface and type size (Times Roman, generally in 11.5 point)
- layout of provisions, including:
 - indentation
 - position of section headings (eg, the number and heading now appear above the section)
- format of definitions (eg, the defined term now appears in bold type, without quotation marks)
- format of dates (eg, a date formerly expressed as “the 1st day of January 1999” is now expressed as “1 January 1999”)

- position of the date of assent (it now appears on the front page of each Act)
- punctuation (eg, colons are not used after definitions)
- Parts numbered with roman numerals are replaced with arabic numerals, and all cross-references are changed accordingly
- case and appearance of letters and words, including:
 - format of headings (eg, headings where each word formerly appeared with an initial capital letter followed by small capital letters are amended so that the heading appears in bold, with only the first word (and any proper nouns) appearing with an initial capital letter)
 - small capital letters in section and subsection references are now capital letters
- schedules are renumbered (eg, Schedule 1 replaces First Schedule), and all cross-references are changed accordingly
- running heads (the information that appears at the top of each page)
- format of two-column schedules of consequential amendments, and schedules of repeals (eg, they are rearranged into alphabetical order, rather than chronological).
