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## Order

### 1 Title

This order may be cited as the Speedlink Carriers Limited Vesting Order 1991.

### 2 Interpretation

(1) In this order, unless the context otherwise requires,—

**the Act** means the New Zealand Railways Corporation Restructuring Act 1990

**the Company** means Speedlink Carriers Limited

**owner-driver agreement** means an agreement known as an owner-driver agreement entered into between the Corporation and another person and in the Corporation's standard form for that agreement for the provision by that person of parcel delivery services in connection with the parcel delivery business carried on by the Corporation.

(2) Any term or expression which is not defined in this order, but which is defined in the Act, has the meaning given to it by the Act.

### 3 Vesting of rights and obligations under certain contracts in Company

The railways assets and railways liabilities of the Corporation, being the rights and obligations of the Corporation under every owner-driver agreement and being the assets and liabilities set out in a list prepared pursuant to section 6 of the Act by the Minister of Finance and the Minister for State Owned Enterprises dated 2 May 1991, shall vest in the Company on 13 May 1991.

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### **Explanatory note**

*This note is not part of the order, but is intended to indicate its general effect.*

This order, which is made pursuant to the New Zealand Railways Corporation Restructuring Act 1990, vests the assets and liabilities referred to in the order in Speedlink Carriers Limited on 13 May 1991.

In general terms the assets and liabilities are the rights and obligations of the New Zealand Railways Corporation under contracts with owner-drivers engaged in the parcel delivery business of the Corporation known as Speedlink.

**Notes****1 General**

This is a reprint of the Speedlink Carriers Limited Vesting Order 1991. The reprint incorporates all the amendments to the order as at 9 May 1991, as specified in the list of amendments at the end of these notes.

**2 Status of reprints**

Under section 16D of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989, reprints are presumed to correctly state, as at the date of the reprint, the law enacted by the principal enactment and by the amendments to that enactment. This presumption applies even though editorial changes authorised by section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989 have been made in the reprint.

This presumption may be rebutted by producing the official volumes of statutes or statutory regulations in which the principal enactment and its amendments are contained.

**3 How reprints are prepared**

A number of editorial conventions are followed in the preparation of reprints. For example, the enacting words are not included in Acts, and provisions that are repealed or revoked

#### **4 Changes made under section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989**

Section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989 authorises the making of editorial changes in a reprint as set out in sections 17D and 17E of that Act so that, to the extent permitted, the format and style of the reprinted enactment is consistent with current legislative drafting practice. Changes that would alter the effect of the legislation are not permitted. A new format of legislation was introduced on 1 January 2000. Changes to legislative drafting style have also been made since 1997, and are ongoing. To the extent permitted by section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989, all legislation reprinted after 1 January 2000 is in the new format for legislation and reflects current drafting practice at the time of the reprint.

In outline, the editorial changes made in reprints under the authority of section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989 are set out below, and they have been applied, where relevant, in the preparation of this reprint:

- omission of unnecessary referential words (such as “of this section” and “of this Act”)
- typeface and type size (Times Roman, generally in 11.5 point)
- layout of provisions, including:
  - indentation
  - position of section headings (eg, the number and heading now appear above the section)
- format of definitions (eg, the defined term now appears in bold type, without quotation marks)
- format of dates (eg, a date formerly expressed as “the 1st day of January 1999” is now expressed as “1 January 1999”)

- position of the date of assent (it now appears on the front page of each Act)
- punctuation (eg, colons are not used after definitions)
- Parts numbered with roman numerals are replaced with arabic numerals, and all cross-references are changed accordingly
- case and appearance of letters and words, including:
  - format of headings (eg, headings where each word formerly appeared with an initial capital letter followed by small capital letters are amended so that the heading appears in bold, with only the first word (and any proper nouns) appearing with an initial capital letter)
  - small capital letters in section and subsection references are now capital letters
- schedules are renumbered (eg, Schedule 1 replaces First Schedule), and all cross-references are changed accordingly
- running heads (the information that appears at the top of each page)
- format of two-column schedules of consequential amendments, and schedules of repeals (eg, they are rearranged into alphabetical order, rather than chronological).
