

AN ACT to incorporate the Campbelltown Athenæum. Title.
[12th October, 1875.]

WHEREAS there has been established at Campbelltown, Bluff Harbour, an Athenæum having for its objects the providing and maintaining there for the use of the members, a Reading-room, Library, Museum, and the promotion of an interest in science, literature, and art, by means of lectures, classes, and otherwise, and generally the usual purposes of an Athenæum: And whereas it is desirable to incorporate the members thereof, and to vest certain lands in such corporation: Preamble.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. The Short Title of this Act shall be “The Campbelltown Athenæum Act, 1875.” Short Title.

2. James Waddel, Samuel Nicol, Thomas Thompson, together with such other persons as are now or may from time to time become members of the institution called the Campbelltown Athenæum, are hereby made a body politic and corporate in deed name and law, by the name of “The Campbelltown Athenæum,” and shall have perpetual succession and a common seal. Incorporation of members, name, seal.

3. The said corporation may sue and be sued, implead and be impleaded, answer and be answered, in all the Courts of the colony. May sue &c.

4. It shall be lawful for any person or corporation to grant convey assure and give to the said corporation, or in trust for it, any kind of real or personal property.

Power to corporation
to hold property.

5. The said corporation is hereby enabled to receive purchase and hold real and personal property of every kind required for the purposes of an Athenæum.

Certain lands
granted to cor-
poration.

6. The pieces of land described in the Schedule, being lands heretofore duly dedicated for the purposes of the Campbelltown Athenæum, are hereby declared to be vested in the said corporation for an estate in fee-simple.

Power of corporation
to alienate limited.

7. The said corporation shall not be able to alienate any of its real property, except by way of lease for a term not exceeding twenty-one years, and with the written consent of two-thirds of its members; nor to sell assign or in any way alienate its personal property.

Interest of members
defined.

8. No member shall have any personal individual joint or transmissible right or interest in or to the whole or any part of the property of the said corporation.

Members may make
regulations.

9. A majority of members may, from time to time, make regulations for determining the conditions of membership and for managing the affairs of the said corporation: Provided however—

(1.) That no meeting shall be held except after fourteen days' notice in one of the local newspapers published in Otago, which notice shall state precisely the business which the meeting is called to transact.

(2.) Every meeting shall be held in Campbelltown.

(3.) Voting at every meeting may be by proxy in writing.

(4.) A meeting may be convened by any five members.

When corporation
shall cease to exist.

10. The said corporation shall cease to exist if at any time the number of members shall fall below ten.
