AN ACT to amend the Law relating to the Superannuation of Title.  
Judges of the Supreme Court. [4th September, 1903.]

BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. The Short Title of this Act is “The Supreme Court Judges Short Title.  
Act, 1903”; and it shall form part of and be read together with “The  
Supreme Court Act, 1882.”

2. Every Judge of the Supreme Court hereafter appointed shall Age of retirement.  
retire from office on attaining the age of seventy-two years, and on  
such retirement shall, if he has held office for any term as mentioned  
in section thirteen of “The Supreme Court Act, 1882,” be entitled  
to the superannuation allowance provided by that section.

3. Every Judge in office on the passing of this Act who has Retirement of  
Judges now in  
office.  
attained the age of seventy-two years, or hereafter attains that age,  
may resign his office, and thereupon the following provisions shall  
apply:—

- (a.) He shall be entitled to forthwith receive six months’ full  
pay, computed from the date of the resignation; and
- (b.) He shall also be entitled to a superannuation allowance  
in like manner as if he had resigned under section  
thirteen of “The Supreme Court Act, 1882”: Provided  
that such allowance shall be computed at a rate of not  
less than six-twelfths of the salary he was receiving at  
the date of his resignation, and shall commence on the  
expiration of six months from that date.
