A BILL INTITULED

AN ACT to establish an Elective Legislative Council in Title New Zealand.

WHEREAS it is expedient and necessary that there shall be, in Preamble. and for New Zealand, an elective Legislative Council:

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the General Assembly of New

Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, 5 as follows :-

1. The Short Title of this Act is "The Elective Council Act, Short Title. 1879."

2. There shall be within the Colony of New Zealand a Legislative Establishment of an Council, in lieu and place of the Legislative Council heretofore elected Legislative Council. 10 existing, the members of which shall be elected by the electors of the said colony.

3. Such Legislative Council shall consist of of whom shall be Europeans and

The Governor shall cause the first writs for the election of members of the said Legislative Council to be issued on the first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, and upon the expiration of the said period of the continuance of the Legislative Council the Governor shall cause writs to be issued for the election of members of 5 the succeeding Legislative Council, and so on from time to time as the period of the continuance of each such Legislative Council expires.

8. When and so often as a vacancy shall occur in any seat in the said Legislative Council, the said Legislative Council shall address the Governor stating the existence of such vacancy and the cause thereof, 10 and the Governor upon receiving such address shall cause a writ to issue for supplying such vacancy.

9. The said Legislative Council shall immediately upon their first meeting proceed to the choice of one of their members as their Speaker during the continuance of the said House, and in case of 15 vacancy by death, resignation, or otherwise, then and so often as the same shall happen the choice shall be repeated as aforesaid.

10. The said Legislative Council at its first sitting, and from time to time afterwards as there shall be occasion, shall prepare and adopt such Standing Rules and Orders as shall appear to the said Council 20 best adapted for the orderly conduct of the business of such Council, and until such Rules and Orders shall be passed and adopted, the Standing Rules and Orders of the present Legislative Council shall be the Standing Rules and Orders of the Legislative Council so to be elected as hereinbefore provided. 25

11. The said Legislative Council so to be elected shall have all the privileges, powers, and duties, and shall hold the same position in the General Assembly of New Zealand, in all respects, as the present Legislative Council now possess and occupy.

12. The said Legislative Council shall, until provision be made 30 otherwise in that behalf by law, be judges without appeal of the validity of the election of each member thereof.

13. No member of such Lecislative Council shall be permitted to sit or vote therein until he shall have taken and subscribed the following oath before the Governor, or before some person or persons 35 authorized by him to administer such oath :---

"I, A.B., do sincerely promise and swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to Her Majesty Queen Victoria; so help me God."

14. Every person authorized by law to make his solemn affirma- 40 tion or declaration, instead of taking an oath, may make such affirmation or declaration in lieu of the said oath.

15. It shall be lawful for any member of such Legislative Council, by writing under his hand addressed to the Speaker of the said Council, to resign his seat in the said Council, and upon such 45 resignation the seat of such member shall become vacant.

16. If any Legislative Councillor of New Zealand shall for one whole session of the General Assembly, without the permission of such Council, fail to give his attendance in the said Council, or shall take any oath or make any declaration or acknowledgement of allegiance, 50 obedience, or adherence to any foreign Prince or Power, or do or concur in or adopt any act whereby he may become a subject or citizen of any foreign State or Power, or become entitled to the rights, privileges, or immunities of a subject of any foreign State or Power, or shall become bankrupt, or shall become a public defaulter, or be attainted of treason, 55 or be convicted of felony or any infamous crime, his seat in such Council shall thereby become vacant.
