Maori Representation.

ANALYSIS.

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A BILL INTITULED

An Act to provide for the Representation of the Title. Maori People in the House of Representatives.

BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:-

1. The Short Title of this Act is "The Maori Representation Act, Short Title. **5** 1879."

2. In the construction of this Act the terms and expressions Interpretation. following shall have the meanings hereby assigned to them respectively, unless there be something in the context or subject-matter repugnant to such meaning, that is to say,-

"Maori" means a male aboriginal native inhabitant of New Zealand, and includes any male half-caste living as a member of a Native tribe according to their customs and usages, and any male descendant of such half-caste by a

Maori woman. "Registrar" means a person appointed under this Act to register Maori electors.

"Returning Officer" means a person appointed to conduct elections under this Act.

"District" means an electoral district constituted under the provisions of this Act.

3. Every Maori twenty-one years of age and upwards, who shall not have been attainted or convicted of any treason, felony, or infamous offence, is entitled to be registered as an elector, and to vote at the elections of Maori members for the House of Representatives in respect of the district for which he registered.

4. Every Maori duly registered as an elector, but no other person, is qualified to be a Maori member of the House of Representatives for any division of the colony under this Act.

5. The number of Maori members to be elected for the whole colony shall bear to the entire number of the members of the House 10 of Representatives (exclusive of the Maori members thereof) the same proportion as the number of registered Maori electors shall bear to the entire number of registered electors on the rolls of the several electoral districts of the colony constituted for the election of members of the European race.

6. In order to form a complete list of Maoris so qualified as aforesaid, the Governor shall appoint a sufficient number of suitable persons throughout the colony, and allot to each such person a defined

7. It shall be the duty of each such person to form a list for the 20 area for which he is appointed, by placing thereon the names (in alphabetical order according to the manner usual with Maori names) of all Maoris resident within the area who, in his opinion, are of the full age of twenty-one years and upwards, and who shall consent in writing to be placed on such list.

8. The list so made shall be signed by the person making the same, and shall be transmitted to the Registrar-General, who shall, as soon as he shall have received the lists for all the several areas, add together the total number of names therein contained.

9. He shall then ascertain the number of Maori members to be 30 returned for the whole colony, in accordance with the proportion hereinbefore prescribed, and, with the assistance of such persons as the Governor shall appoint for that purpose, shall apportion the colony into as many districts as there are Maori members to be returned.

10. Each such district shall be formed in such manner that the 35 number of qualified electors within the several districts shall be, as nearly as may be, equal to one another, taking especial care, however, that each single Native tribe, so far as conveniently may be, shall be aggregated within the same district.

11. To every district so formed as aforesaid, there shall be 40 assigned one member, to be elected by such district.

12. After the division of the colony into districts, as herein provided, the Registrar-General, with such assistance as aforesaid, shall form the first electoral rolls for every such district, by placing thereon the names in alphabetical order of all Maoris residing in the district 45 who are on the lists hereinbefore mentioned of Maoris qualified to be electors.

13. For every district the Governor shall appoint some competent person to be the Registrar thereof, who, before acting in his office, shall take an oath before a Justice of the Peace, and such 50 Justice shall transmit a record of the same to the Native Minister.

It shall be the duty of every Registrar to make the rolls as complete and correct as possible, and with that object to place thereon or add thereto the name of every Maori of whose qualification to be an elector he is satisfied, and who shall consent in writing to be placed 55

Provided that no name shall be placed on the roll of any district after a writ has been issued under this Act for the election of a member of such district until such election has terminated.

14. The elections of all Maori members shall be conducted 60° according to the following regulations:-

Conduct of elections.

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(1.) There shall be one Returning Officer for each Maori electoral division, to be appointed by the Governor, and the Returning Officer shall have power to appoint, on the occasion of any election, such Deputy Returning Officers 5 as he may deem necessary. (2.) Every Returning Officer and Deputy Returning Officer shall, before acting in his office, take an oath before a Justice of the Peace in the Form A, and such Justice of the Peace shall transmit a record of the same to the 10 Colonial Secretary. (3.) Polling-places shall be appointed by the Governor in each district of every Maori electoral division, and notice of the places so appointed shall be published in the Kahiti for at least thirty days previous to the day of nomination. (4.) The Governor shall issue a writ in the Form B, specifying 15 the day and place of nomination, and the day on which the poll, if necessary, shall take place, which shall not be earlier than fourteen days after the day of the nomination. (5.) The above writ shall be forwarded to each Returning Officer, and a copy thereof shall be published in the Kahiti 20 and Gazette, and posted in such public places as shall be thought desirable by the Returning Officer. (6.) On the day of nomination, so to be fixed as aforesaid, the Returning Officer shall preside at a meeting to be held at noon at the appointed place, and shall declare the purpose 25 for which the meeting is held. It shall be competent to the Returning Officer to declare the meeting adjourned from day to day till the election is completed. (7.) Every candidate shall be proposed by one and seconded by 30 another registered elector; and if no more than one candidate shall be so proposed and seconded, the Returning Officer shall declare such candidate duly elected, and make his return accordingly. (8.) In the event of there being more candidates than one proposed and seconded, the Returning Officer shall call for a 35 show of hands, separately, in favour of each candidate, and after such show shall declare the name of the person in whose favour the show of hands shall appear to have been largest; and if thereupon a poll be not demanded by one 40 of the candidates, the Returning Officer shall declare such person to be duly elected, and indorse and return and forward the writ as provided by subsection fourteen. (9.) If a poll be demanded as aforesaid, the Returning Officer shall then declare the day on which the same shall be taken, being the day fixed by the writ as aforesaid, and 45 on that day the poll shall be taken at the places appointed as aforesaid; it shall commence at nine o'clock in the forenoon of the day appointed, and shall close at six o'clock in the afternoon of the same day. 50 Care shall be taken that no nomination or polling at any election of a member for any Maori electoral district shall occur on the same day as any other election is in progress within any part of such district. (10.) If a poll be demanded, the Returning Officer shall imme-

diately make arrangements for the issue at each pollingplace of voting papers to electors, and such papers may be issued at any time or times appointed by the Returning

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(11.) On the day of the poll the electors shall enter one by one the polling-booth, and shall each present his voting paper, which shall be in the Form C, and in the English and in the Maori language, and, when requested to do so, shall state the name of the candidate for whom he intends to vote, and his own name. The Returning Officer or his deputy shall thereupon write the name of such candidate and elector on the voting paper, and any scrutineer may place his initials or name upon the paper as witness.

(12.) The Returning Officer shall, as soon as convenient, 10 immediately after the closing of the poll, proceed, with such of his deputies and scrutineers as can conveniently attend, to ascertain the numbers polled for each candidate, and shall sign a notice and declaration stating the number of votes polled for each candidate, and declare the can-15

didate having the greatest number duly elected.

The Returning Officer shall forthwith publish such notice and declaration in the *Gazette* and in the *Kahiti*.

(13.) If two or more candidates have received an equal number of votes, the Returning Officer shall give a casting vote.

(14.) The Returning Officer shall thereupon indorse on the writ a certificate stating the name of the person elected, and shall forthwith return the writ to the Governor. He shall also, as soon as practicable, enclose and seal up in a parcel all the voting papers relating to the electoral district, and 25 transmit the same to the Governor.

15. The Governor shall forward the writ so indorsed, together with a sealed packet containing all the voting papers and indorsed with the name of the district and verified by his signature, to the Clerk of the House of Representatives.

The sealed packet shall be safely kept for one year unopened, except by the lawful command of a competent Court or other tribunal.

At the end of one year the packet shall be burnt unopened, in the presence of the said Clerk and one of the Commissioners of Audit.

16. If after the day of nomination and before the day appointed for the poll a candidate dies, the Returning Officer shall, upon being satisfied of the fact of such death, countermand notice of the poll, and all proceedings with reference to the election shall be commenced afresh in all respects as if the writ had been received by him on the day on which proof was given him of such death.

17. Where by these regulations it is directed that any notice or copy of any instrument is to be published in the *Kahiti*, such publication shall be in the Maori language, and where by these regulations it is directed that any notice or copy of any instrument is to be published in the *Gazette*, such publication shall be in the English language.

18. In any case not provided for in the above regulations the Returning Officer shall, as far as possible, be guided by the provisions of this Act, mutatis mutandis, in relation to election of European members for the House of Representatives.

In case of death of candidate, new election to be had.

Notices to be printed in Maori or English.

In cases not herein provided for, Acts relating to elections of European members to apply.

FORM A.

I [A.B.], Returning Officer for the Maori Electoral Division [or one of the Deputy Returning Officers or Registration Officers], do promise and swear that I will faithfully perform the duties of Returning Officer [or Deputy Returning Officer or Registration Officer] to the best of my ability—So help me God.

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FORM B.

VICTORIA, by the grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the Islands of New Zealand, &c., Queen, to , Esquire, Returning Officer for the Maori Electoral Division,—Greeting:

Whereas it is necessary that an election of member of the House of Representatives of New Zealand shall take place: Now, therefore, we do hereby require and command you to cause to be elected by the voters duly qualified for that purpose, freely and indifferently, and in manner and form by law and regulations in this behalf prescribed, legally qualified person to serve as member of the said House of Representatives for the Maori Electoral Division: And we do hereby further require and command that you cause the nomination of the said member to be at , on the day of , and the polling, in case it shall be required, to be at the several polling-places, on the day of , and that this our writ, with the name of the person so elected indorsed thereon by you, shall be returned to the General Registrar on or before the
