A BILL INTITULED

AN ACT to declare and explain the Trusts of the Auckland College and Grammar School Endowments, and for other purposes. Title.

WHEREAS by "The Auckland College and Grammar School Act, 1877," a Board of Governors was constituted for the management of the Auckland College and Grammar School or Schools, with the powers and duties therein defined, and by the seventeenth section of the said Act it was enacted that, in all cases unprovided for by the said Act, it should be lawful for the said Board to act in such a manner as should appear to them best calculated to further the purposes intended to be served by the establishment of the said College and Grammar School or Schools, in accordance with the trusts under which the trust property was originally granted: Preamble.

And whereas it is expedient to declare and explain such trusts, and to alter the constitution of the said Board:

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. The Short Title of this Act is "The Auckland College and Grammar School Act, 1879." Short Title.

2. The trusts referred to in the said recited Act shall be,—

(1.) The establishment hereafter, whenever the funds shall be sufficient, of a college:

(2.) The maintenance of a school or schools for imparting to all suitably-prepared youths who may desire it a higher education than that attainable in the common schools, and the instruction in such school, free of charge, of as many foundation scholars as the state of the funds from time to time will allow:

(3.) The keeping open evening classes for imparting instruction in subjects beyond the scope of the common schools to persons unable to devote their days to such objects.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

ALL that piece or parcel of land in the Town of Napier, containing by admeasurement 3 roods, more or less, being the whole of Town Sections numbered 130, 131, and 132 on the Government plan of the Town of Napier. Bounded towards the North-east by Town Sections 133, 134, and part of 135 on the aforesaid plan, 250 links; towards the South-east by Town Sections 128, 127, and 126 on the aforesaid plan, 300 links; on the South-west by Church Road, 250 links; and on the North-west by Browning Street, 300 links.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

ALL that piece or parcel of land in the Town of Napier, containing by admeasurement 2 roods 15 perches, more or less, being Section No. 132, and parts of Sections 131 and 130 on the Government plan of the Town of Napier. Bounded towards the North-east by Town Sections 133, 134, and part of 135 on the aforesaid plan, 250 links; towards the South-east by Town Sections 128, 127, and part of 126 on the aforesaid plan, 288 links; towards the South-west by Church Road, 125 links, and part of Town Section 131 on the aforesaid plan, 125 links; on the North-west by parts of Town Sections 130 and 131 on the aforesaid plan, 88 links and 12 links respectively, and by Browning Street, 188 links.
