A BILL INTITULED

An Act to regulate the Exercise of certain Franchises by certain Title. Naturalized British Subjects and other Persons, and for that Purpose to amend certain Acts relating to Parliamentary Elections and Elections for Local-government Areas, and to 5 Justices of the Peace, Coroners, Licensing Magistrates, and Jurors; and for Purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto.

BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand 10 in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as

1. (1.) This Act may be cited as the Naturalized Subjects' Fran- Short Title and chise Act, 1916, and shall take effect during the continuance of the present war between His Majesty and any of His Majesty's enemies, 15 and for a period of six months after the conclusion of the war.

(2.) In this Act, unless the context otherwise requires, Definition. "Naturalized British subject of enemy origin" means a naturalized male or female British subject who at the time of his or her naturalization was a subject of a country with which the British

2. A naturalized British subject of enemy origin shall be incap- Naturalized British able of being elected to or sitting or voting in-

(a.) The Legislative Council;
(b.) The House of Representatives;
(c.) The Council of any local authority;

or of officiating as a Justice of the Peace, a Coroner, a member of a Licensing Committee, or as a juror, or of obtaining a license under the Licensing Act, 1908, or of being granted a renewal of an existing license under that Act.

3. A naturalized British subject of enemy origin shall not be qualified to have his name entered or retained on any electoral roll compiled under the Legislature Act, 1908, or under any Act relating to local government.

4. (1.) A naturalized British subject of enemy origin shall not 5 vote at an election under the Legislature Act, 1908, or under any Act relating to local government.

(2.) If any such person votes at any such election or referendum

he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.

5. (1.) At any poll taken under the Legislature Act, 1908, or 10 any Act relating to local government, the presiding officer shall put to any person claiming to vote bearing a name suggesting that he is an alien of enemy origin all or any of the following questions:—

(a.) Are you a subject of any of the countries (naming them)
with which Great Britain is at war?

(b.) Are you a naturalized British subject?

(c.) What was your nationality immediately before the grant of your certificate of naturalization; or (in the case of a wife or child of a naturalized British subject of enemy origin) what was your nationality at the time of 20 naturalization?

(2.) The presiding officer may require the production of any certificate of naturalization as a condition to admitting the said

person to vote, or may dispense with such production.

(3.) If any person refuses to answer fully any question put to 25 him as aforesaid, or by his answer shows that he is not entitled to have his name on the roll or to vote, his claim to vote shall be

rejected.

6. If any person to whom a question is put in pursuance of this Act wilfully makes a false answer to the same or to any part thereof, 30 he shall be liable to imprisonment for any term not exceeding six months, or to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds, or to both imprisonment and fine.

7. The Governor may make regulations to carry out the provisions of this Act, and in such regulations may impose for any 35 breach thereof a fine not exceeding twenty pounds.
