A BILL INTITULED

AN ACT to vest Portion of the Foreshore of the Manukau Harbour in the Papakura Town Board. Title.

BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. This Act may be cited as the Papakura Beach Vesting Act, 1915. Short Title.

2. That part of the foreshore of the Manukau Harbour described in the Schedule hereto shall, on the passing hereof, vest in the Papakura Town Board (hereafter called the Board) for an estate in fee-simple, subject to all public and private rights of navigation thereover; and the District Land Registrar, at Auckland, shall, upon the request of the Board, issue to the Board a certificate of title to the said land for such estate and interest. Foreshore to vest in Papakura Town Board.

SCHEDULE.

ALL that area in the Auckland Land District containing 4 acres 3 roods 23 perches, more or less: bounded—commencing at the westernmost corner of Allotment 11 of Section 6, Papakura Parish—towards the north-east generally by high-water mark of Manukau Harbour, the western boundary of Papakura Town District as described in the *New Zealand Gazette* of 17th August, 1882, page 1106, to the southernmost corner of Lot 18 of Allotment 14 of Section 6 aforesaid: towards the south-east by a line bearing 232° 37', 110 links: towards the south-west by lines bearing 285° 10', 662.8 links; 315° 21', 510 links; 343° 25', 887 links; 301° 19', 549.4 links; and 329° 35', 609 links: and towards the north-west by a line bearing 55° 55', 134.2 links, to the point of commencement: as the same is delineated on the plan marked L. and S. deposited in the Head Office, Department of Lands and Survey, at Wellington; and on the plan deposited in the Survey Office, at Auckland, numbered 17912 (blue), and thereon edged red.
