A BILL to amend the Law relating to Title the Elections of Superintendents of Provinces, and Members of Provincial Councils.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand, in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1.—DIVISION OF PROVINCES INTO ELECTORAL DISTRICTS.

I. It shall be lawful for the Superintendent of every Pro- Provincial Councils vince, with the advice and consent of the Provincial Council into Electoral Disthereof, from time to time to divide such Province into Electoral uricu. Districts for the Election of Members of the Provincial Council, and any such division from time to time to annul and alter : AProvided always that until any such division shall be made, the

Electoral Districts existing at the time of the passing hereof in any Province shall continue to be the Electoral Districts for the Election of Members of the Provincial Council of such Province,

2.—QUALIFICATION OF ELECTORS.

Electors of Superin-

II. Every man who shall be registered as an Elector for the House of Representatives shall be entitled to vote at Elections of the Superintendent of any and every Province, in which there shall be situate any tenements or hereditaments, in respect of which he is so registered as an Elector.

Electors of Members of Provincial Council.

III. Every man who shall be registered as an Elector for the House of Representatives shall be entitled to vote for Members of the Provincial Council for every Electoral District in which there shall be situate any tenements or hereditaments, in respect of which he is so registered as an Elector.

Will Electoral Rolls.

3.—REGISTRATION OF ELECTORS.

The Electoral Rolls for the House of Representatives shall be conclusive evidence of the right of the persons, whose names shall be thereon as Electors, to vote at Elections of Su-perintendents of Provinces, and Members of the Provincial Councils as hereinbefore provided.

4.—CONDUCT OF ELECTIONS.

Y. Every Election of the Superintendent, or of a Member of the Provincial Council, of a Province, shall be conducted in manner prescribed by a Proclamation bearing date the 5th day of March, 1853, given under the hand of Sir George Grey, the then Governor of New Zealand, and issued under the Public Seal thereof, until other provisions shall be made in that behalf by a Law to be passed by the General Assembly of New Zealand, or by the Superintendent and Provincial Council of such Province: Provided always, that for the Election of a Superintendent of a Province, the whole of such Province shall be deemed to be one Electoral District, and one Writ only shall be issued for such Election, and shall be addressed to the Principal Re-Reas any Dturning Officer of the Capital Town of the Province, who shall hold the nomination at such Capital Town.

5 .- CONTROVERTED ELECTIONS, ETC.

VI. The right of any person claiming to hold the office of Superintendent, or to be a Member of a Provincial Council, shall be determined on information in the nature of a Quo Warranto, and by no other mode, except in such cases as are provided for by the 11th Section of the "Constitution Act."

VII. The Writ of Mandamus shall lie in respect of Superintendents of Provinces, and Provincial Councils, and Members thereof, in all cases whatsoever to which such a mode of proceeding is applicable.

3 6 .- CORRUPT PRACTICES. VIII. An Act passed by the General Assembly of New Zealand intituled "The Corrupt Practices Act, 1858," shall be deemed to apply to any Election of Superintendent of a Province, and of any Member of a Provincial Council of any Province. IX. This Act shall apply to every Province now, or to be Application of Acc at any time hereafter established, in the Colony of New Zealand. X. This Act may, for all purposes, be cited as "The Short Tule. Provincial Elections Act, 1858."
