PURE FOOD.

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A BILL INTITULED

AN ACT to make Better Provision for the Sale of Food and Drugs Title. in a Pure State.

BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand 5 in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :-

1. (1.) This Act may be cited as the Pure Food Act, 1907, and Short Title. shall form part of and be read together with the Public Health Act, 1900.

(2.) This Act shall come into operation on the first day of 10 January, nineteen hundred and eight.

2. In this Act, if not inconsistent with the context,-

- "Analyst" means an analyst appointed under this Act:
- "Appliance" includes the whole or any part of any utensil, machinery, instrument, apparatus, or article used or intended for use in or for the making, keeping, preparing, or supplying of any food:
- "Drug" includes medicine, whether for internal or external use :
- "Food" includes every article which is used for food or drink by man, or which enters into or is used in the composition or preparation of any such article, and also includes flavouring matters and condiments :

Commencement of Act.

Interpretation.

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"Officer" means an officer of the Health Department or any constable authorised by the Chief Health Officer:

- "Package" includes every means by which goods for carriage or for sale are cased, covered, enclosed, contained, or packed:
- "Sale" or "sell" includes barter, and also includes offering or attempting to sell or receiving for sale, or having in possession for sale, or exposing for sale, or sending or delivering for sale, or causing or allowing to be sold, offered, or exposed for sale, and refers only to sale for 10 human consumption or use.

3. The Governor may from time to time appoint analysts for the purposes of this Act, and may pay them such remuneration as may be appropriated by Parliament for the purpose.

- 4. (1.) Any officer may-
- (a.) At all reasonable times enter into and inspect any place where there is any food or drug which he has reasonable ground for believing to be intended for sale or for-human consumption; and
- (b.) Mark, seal, or otherwise secure, weigh, count, or measure 20 any food or drug the sale, preparation, or manufacture of which is or appears to be contrary to the provisions of this Act; and
- (c.) Seize any food or drug, wherever found, which is or appears to be unwholesome or deleterious to health; and
- (d.) Destroy any food or drug, wherever found, which is or-becomes decayed or putrefied; and

New paragraph.

(e.) Inspect any food or drug, wherever found, which he has reasonable ground for believing to be intended for sale. 30

(2.) Any person claiming any thing seized under this section may within forty-eight hours after such seizure complain thereof to any Justice, and such complaint may be heard and determined before a Magistrate or any two Justices, who may either confirm or disallow such seizure wholly or in part, and may order the article seized to be 35 restored.

(3.) If within forty-eight hours after such seizure no complaint has been made, or if such seizure is confirmed, the article seized shall become the property of the Crown, and shall be destroyed or otherwise disposed of so as to prevent it being used for human con- 40 sumption.

(4.) Where the seizure of any food or drug is made on-premises which are in any place which is not in the occupation of the owner of the thing seized, the officer making the seizure shall forthwith give notice in writing of the seizure to the owner, or to the consignor or consignee, or to the agent of the owner, of the thing seized, if his name and address are attached thereto or are otherwise known to the officer, and such address is in New Zealand.

(5.) Any person who obstructs any officer in the exercise of his 50 powers under this section is guilty of an offence.

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5. (1.) On payment or offer tender to any person selling or making Power to de any food or drug, or to his agent or servant, of a reasonable price select, and tak the current market value therefor, any officer may at any place demand and select and take or obtain samples of the said food or 5 drug for the purposes of analysis. (2.) Any such officer may require the said person or his agent or servant to show and permit the inspection of the package in which such food or drug is at the time kept and to take therefrom the samples demanded. 10 (3.) Where any food or drug is kept for retail sale in an unopened package, no person shall be required by any officer to sell less than the whole of the contents of such package. (4.) Every person who refuses or neglects to comply with any demand or requisition made by an officer in pursuance of this section 15 is liable to a fine not exceeding *twenty* pounds, unless he proves that he had no knowledge or reason to believe that the sample demanded was required for the purpose of analysis. 6. Any person may on payment of the prescribed fee, together Any person may with the cost of the sample, require any constable to purchase a have sam analysed. 20 sample of any food or drug and submit the same for analysis. Where it is intended to submit any sample for analysis, Samples, how taken. 25 the officer purchasing or otherwise procuring it shall before or forthwith after procuring it inform the seller or his agent selling the article, or-the-person-in-whose-possession-the-article-was-at-the-time-the sample-was-procured,-or-the-person-from-whom-the-sample-was-procured, that he intends to have the same analysed by an analyst. (2.) He shall thereupon divide the article sample into three 30 parts, and shall mark and seal or fasten up in such manner as its nature will permit each such part, and shall offer one of such parts to the seller or his agent or-other-person-as-aforesaid. (3.) He shall subsequently deliver another of such parts to an 35 analyst, and shall retain the third of such parts. (4.) Delivery to an analyst under this section may be effected either personally or by sending the-thing a part as aforesaid by registered post addressed to the analyst at his usual address. 8. (1.) The certificate of the analyst shall be in the form pre-Certificate of scribed by regulations. analyst. 40

(2.) Where any method of analysis, chemical or physical, has been prescribed by regulations hereunder for the analysis of any food or drug, any analyst, either for the prosecution or defence, shall in his certificate of analysis declare that he has followed the 45 prescribed method in his analysis.

(3.) A copy of the result of any analysis of any food or drug procured by an officer may be obtained from the analyst by the person from whom the thing article so analysed was purchased or obtained, on payment of a fee not exceeding two shillings and sixpence.

(4.) No such copy of any such analysis shall be used as an adver-50tisement, and if any person so uses it he commits an offence.

9. Every person commits an offence who without authority opens, alters, breaks, removes, or erases any mark, fastening, or seal placed by any officer, in pursuance of the provisions of this Act, upon any food or drug, or upon any package, place, door, or opening containing or affording access to any food or drug.

10. (1.) If in the opinion of the Chief Health Officer there is reasonable ground for suspecting that any person is in possession of any food or drug or other substance for the purpose of sale, or of manufacturing or preparing the same for sale in breach of this Act, he may require such person to produce for his inspection or to 10 produce to any specially authorised officer any books or documents dealing with the reception, possession, purchase, sale, or delivery of any such food or drug or other substance.

(2.) The Chief Health Officer may make or cause to be made copies of or extracts from any such books or documents, and such 15 copies or extracts, certified as such by any specially authorised officer, shall be deemed to be true and correct copies or extracts, unless the contrary is proved.

(3.) Every person who refuses or neglects to comply with any requisition made in pursuance of this section commits an offence.

(4.) Every officer who does not maintain the secrecy of all matters which come to his knowledge in the performance of his official duties under this section, or who communicates any such matter to any person whomsoever, except for the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of this Act, is liable to a fine not 25 exceeding *fifty* pounds.

11. Where food in connection with which there is a breach of any of the provisions of this Act is sold in an unopened package, any person who appears from any statement thereon or attached thereto to have imported or manufactured or prepared such food 30 or to have enclosed it in such package shall, unless he proves the contrary, be deemed to have so imported, manufactured, prepared, or enclosed the same, and shall be liable to the same fine as if he had actually sold the same.

12. (1.) Every person commits an offence who sells any 35adulterated food or adulterated drug without fully informing the purchaser at the time of the sale of the nature of the adulteration, unless the package containing the same shall have conspicuously printed thereon a true description of the composition of such food or drug. 40

(2.) Every person commits an offence who sells any food or drug in any package which bears or has attached thereto any false or misleading statement, word, brand, label, or mark purporting to indicate the nature, quality, strength, purity, composition, origin, age, or proportion of the article contained in the package or of any 45 ingredient thereof.

(3.) Every person commits an offence who sells any food or drug containing any substance the addition of which is prohibited by regulations made under the authority of this Act.

(1.) Every person commits an offence who sells any food or 50 drug containing a greater proportion of any substance than is permitted by regulations made under the authority of this Act.

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(5.) Every person commits an offence who sells any food which contains methyl alcohol, or which, not having paid Customs or excise duty, contains more than two parts of proof spirit per centum. New subclause.

(5A.) Every person commits an offence who sells any food which $\mathbf{5}$ is unsound or unfit for human consumption.

(6.) Every person committing any offence mentioned in this section is liable for the first offence to a fine not exceeding *fifty* pounds, and for any subsequent offence under the said section 10 (whether of the same or a different nature) to a fine not exceeding *two* hundred pounds:

Provided that if any such offence is wilfully committed, the person so committing it is liable to a fine not exceeding two hundred pounds or to three months' imprisonment, although it may be a 15 first offence.

New subclause.

(7.) The provisions of subsection one of this section are subject to such exceptions as may be prescribed by regulations made by the Governor in Council and gazetted.

13. It shall be no defence in any prosecution for an offence under the *last preceding* section that the offence was neither wilful nor negligent, or that the defendant had no knowledge or means of knowledge that the sale of the article sold by him constituted an 25 offence against this Act.

13. In a prosecution for selling any food or drug contrary to the No defence that provisions of this Act, or of any regulation made under the authority of this Act, it shall be no defence that the defendant did not act intentionally 30 wilfully, unless he also proves that he took all reasonable steps to ascertain the nature, quality, quantity, composition, or weight, as the

case may be, of the article sold by him.

14. (1.) Subject to the provisions hereinafter in this section contained, it shall be a good defence in any prosecution for an offence 35 under section *twelve* hereof if the defendant proves that he purchased the article sold by him in reliance on a written warranty or

other written statement as to the nature of the article purchased, signed by or on behalf of the person from whom the defendant purchased the same, and that if the article had truly conformed to such 40 warranty or statement the sale of the article by the defendant would

not have constituted the offence charged against him.

(2.) No warranty or other written statement shall be any defence under this section, unless it is given or made in New Zealand in 45 respect of a sale made in New Zealand by or on behalf of a person resident there or an incorporated company carrying on business there.

New subclause.

(2.) No warranty or other written statement given or made by a 50 person resident outside New Zealand shall be any defence under this section, unless the defendant proves that he had taken reasonable steps to ascertain, and did, in fact, believe in, the truth of the matters set forth in such warranty or statement.

(3.) No warranty or other written statement shall be any defence under this section if it is proved that the defendant knew or had reason to suspect that the article sold did not conform to such warranty or statement.

(4.) No warranty or other written statement shall be any defence 5 in any prosecution, unless the defendant has within seven days after service of the summons delivered to the prosecutor a copy of such warranty or statement with a written notice stating that he intends to rely thereon, and specifying the name and address of the person from whom he received it, and has also within the same time 10 sent by post a like notice of his intention to such person.

(5.) When the defendant is a servant or agent of the person who purchased the article under such a warranty or written statement, he shall be entitled to the benefit of this section in the same manner and to the same extent as his employer or principal would have been 15 if he had been the defendant, unless it is proved that the servant or agent knew or had reason to suspect that the article did not conform to the said warranty or statement.

15. For the purposes of this Act any food or drug shall be deemed to be adulterated—

- (a.) If it contains or is mixed or diluted with any substance which diminishes in any manner its nutritive or other beneficial properties as compared with such article in a pure and normal state and in an undeteriorated and sound condition, or which in any other manner operates 25 or may operate to the prejudice or disadvantage of the purchaser or consumer :
- (b.) If any substance or ingredient has been extracted or omitted therefrom, and by reason of such extraction or omission the nutritive or other beneficial properties of the article 30 as sold are less than those of the article in its pure and normal state, or the purchaser or consumer is or may be in any other manner prejudiced :
- (c.) If it contains or is mixed or diluted with any substance of lower commercial value than such article in a pure and 35 normal state and in an undeteriorated and sound condition :
- (d.) If it does not comply with the standard therefor prescribed by any regulations made under the authority of this Act.

16. For the purposes of this Act every person shall be deemed 40 to sell any food or drug who sells the same either on his own account or as the agent or servant of any other person, and in the case of any sale by an agent or servant his principal or employer shall be under the same liability as if he had effected the sale personally.

17. (1.) In the case of any conviction under this Act the con- 45 victing Magistrate may order that any food or drug to which the conviction relates, and any similar food or drug found on the defendant's premises or in his possession at the time of the offence committed, together with all packages or vessels containing the same, shall be forfeited to the Crown. 50

(2.) Everything so forfeited to the Crown shall be disposed of as the Minister directs.

18. (1.) All proceedings in respect of an offence against this Act Proceedings shall be taken in a summary manner before a Magistrate only.

(2.) The summons in any such proceedings shall not be made returnable in less than fourteen days from the day on which it is 5 served.

(3.) There shall be served with the summons a copy of the analyst's certificate (if any) on which the prosecution is based.

19. A notification of the name and occupation of any person Notification of who has been convicted of an offence against this Act, together with 10 the address of his place or places of business, the nature of the newspapers. offence, and the fine, forfeiture, or other penalty inflicted, shall, if the convicting Magistrate so orders, be published by the Chief Health Officer in any newspaper or newspapers circulating in New Zealand or in any part thereof.

20. (1.) The production by the prosecutor of a certificate of Analysi's certificate 15 analysis purporting to be under the hand of an analyst shall be sufficient evidence of the facts stated therein, unless the defendant requires that the analyst shall be called as a witness, in which case he shall give notice thereof to the prosecutor not less than three clear 20 days before the return day.

(2.) In like manner the production by the defendant of a certificate of analysis purporting to be under the hand of an analyst shall be sufficient evidence of the facts stated therein, unless the prosecutor requires that the analyst be called as a witness.

(3.) A copy of such last-mentioned certificate shall be sent to the 25prosecutor at least three clear days before the return day, and if it is not so sent the Magistrate may adjourn the hearing on such terms as he thinks proper.

21. When a sample has been dealt with in accordance with Magistrate may 30 section seven hereof, the Magistrate shall, on the request of either order independent party to any proceedings for an offence against this Act, and may, if he thinks fit without such request, order that the part of the sample retained by the officer shall be submitted to another analyst for analysis.

22. (1.) The onus of proof that any food or drug was not exposed, Onus of proof. 35 offered, or intended for sale or sold for human consumption shall in every case be on the defendant.

(2). The purchase and sale of a sample of any food or drug under the provisions of this Act for the purpose of analysis shall be

40 deemed to be a purchase and sale of such food or drug for human consumption or use, unless the seller proves that the bulk from which such sample was taken was not offered, exposed, or intended tor sale for human consumption or use.

New subclause.

(3.) For the purposes of this Act every person shall be deemed to 45 sell or to intend to sell any food or drug if he sells or intends to sell for human consumption any article of which such food or drug is a constituent.

23. No prosecutor or witness in any prosecution under this Act source of informa-50 shall be compelled to disclose the fact that he received any infor- tion or reports. mation, or the nature of such information, or the name of any person who gave such information; and no officer appearing as a prosecutor

Every person who commits an offence against this Act for which a penalty is not expressly provided is liable to a fine not exceeding *twenty* pounds for a first offence, and to a fine not exceeding *fifty* pounds for any subsequent offence, whether of the same or of a different nature.

25. (1.) Where any person is convicted of an offence under this Act, the Magistrate shall order that all fees and other expenses 10 incident to the analysis of any food or drug in respect of which the conviction is obtained (including an analysis made under section twenty-one hereof) shall be paid by the person convicted.

(2.) All such fees and expenses shall be deemed to be part of the costs attending the conviction, and shall be recoverable in the same 15 manner as such costs are recoverable.

26. (1.) The Governor may from time to time, by Order in Council gazetted, make regulations—

- (a.) Prescribing the standard of strength, weight, quality, or quantity of any food or drug, or of any ingredient or 20 component part thereof;
- (b.) Prohibiting the addition of any specified thing, or of more than the specified quantity or proportion thereof, to any food or drug;
- (c.) Prohibiting any modes of manufacture, preparation, or 25 preservation of food any food or drug;
- (d.) Securing the cleanliness and freedom from contamination of any food or drug in the course of its manufacture, preparation, storage, packing, carriage, or delivery, and securing the cleanliness of places, receptacles, appliances, 30 and vehicles used in such manufacture, preparation, storage, packing, carriage, or delivery;
- (e.) Prescribing the mode of labelling food or drugs sold in packages, and the matter to be contained or not to be contained in such labels; 35
- (f.) Prescribing the method of analysis of any food or drug;
- (g.) Fixing fees to be paid in respect of the analysis of any food or drug by an analyst;
- (h.) Prohibiting the sale of specified articles of food otherwise than by weight;
- (i.) Prescribing fines not exceeding *fifty* pounds for the breach of any regulation; and
- (j.) Generally for carrying out the purposes of this Act.

(2.) Any such regulation may be made applicable either to foods or drugs generally or to specified fcods or drugs only. 45

New subclause.

(3.) Notwithstanding anything contained in any regulation made under the authority of this section, it shall be lawful for any person, at any time within twelve months after the date of the gazetting of such regulation, to sell any food or drug the sale of which is other- 50 wise lawful, if he proves that at the said date such food or drug was part of the existing stock-in-trade in New Zealand of any person

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carrying on business there, and that since the said date no act has been done whereby the said food or drug fails to conform to the requirements of the said regulation. For the purposes of this subsection any goods purchased before the said date for importation into 5 New Zealand shall be deemed to be part of the purchaser's stock-in-

trade in New Zealand.

26A. A copy of all regulations made under the authority of this Regulations to be Act shall, within twenty-one days after the gazetting thereof, be laid submitted to Parliament. 10 before Parliament if sitting, or if not, then within twenty-one days after the commencement of the next ensuing session.

27. All fees and fines received or recovered under this Act shall Application of fees be paid into the Public Account and shall form part of the Con- and fines. solidated Fund.

28. (1.) The Acts and parts of Acts mentioned in the Schedule Repeals. 15 hereto are hereby repealed.

(2.) All appointments made under any of such repealed Acts shall be deemed to have been made under this Act.
