NOTICE OF MOTION.

1. Hon. Mr. JENNINGS to move, That the Government be requested to amend the Vaccination Act of 1863 in the direction that its provisions shall not be compulsory; and that the activity manifested of late by various responsible officers in summoning citizens of this colony be curtailed, so that the conscientious objection of parents may be considered by the present Parliament.
