

## SUPPLEMENTARY ORDER PAPER.

## HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Tuesday, the 23rd Day of October, 1894.

Mr. SAUNDERS, within seven days of the first meeting of Parliament in 1895, to move, That Standing Order No. 104 be repealed, and the following Order substituted:—

That the Premier, the Colonial Treasurer, and the leader of the Opposition be permitted to speak not more than ten hours in any one lunar month.

That the other members of the Government, and three members to be elected by the Opposition, be permitted to speak five hours in one month. The three last named to be changed during the session only for illness or after a change of Government.

That all other members of the House be permitted to speak for two hours in any one month.

Time spent in asking questions, and not exceeding two minutes for any one question, not to count; and time spent by Ministers in answering questions not to count in any case.

A private member who has not occupied the whole two hours to which he was entitled in any previous month or months may claim to have such time added to the two hours due to him in any future month or months of the same session.

A timekeeper to be appointed, who shall keep a ledger account of the time occupied by each member, and inform the Speaker and the Chairman of Committees when any member has exhausted his allotted time for the current month.
