SHIPPING AND SEAMEN'S ACT AMENDMENT BILL.

Mr. MILLAR, in Committee, to move the following amendments:—

In clause 33: To insert the following amendments in the principal Act:—

Section twenty-eight: Add the following paragraph after the words "grade of master," at end of third paragraph: "Every sea-going vessel of twenty tons net register and over, not included in the foregoing provisions, shall carry as master thereof a duly-certificated man, whose certificate shall not be of a lower grade than a Hometrade master's certificate."

Section thirty-nine: Strike out word "eighty" in the first

line, and substitute "twenty."

Section ninety-six: Add after word "colony," in second line, "or in the colony, by any vessel registered or owned beyond the colony."

Amend First Schedule by striking out the words "square-rigged."

SALE OF WINE, BEER, AND SPIRITUOUS LIQUORS AT BELLAMY'S PROHIBITION BILL.

Mr. Tanner, in Committee, to move the following amendments:— In clause 1, strike out "prohibition," and substitute "control." Strike out clause 2, and substitute the following:

2. The buildings known as the Parliament House, in the City of Wellington, are hereby constituted a special licensing district of the

colony.

On the first day of the session of one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five the Clerk of each House shall conduct a poll, at which members of each House shall vote on the question, Shall beer, wine, or spirituous liquors be sold within the precincts of the Parliament House during the remainder of the present Parliament? -"Aye" or "No"; and shall report the result to the Speakers of the House of Representatives and Legislative Council respectively.

If when the votes taken in both Houses are added together a majority of those voting record their votes against the proposal, then no wine, beer, or spirituous liquors shall be sold within the precincts of Parliament House during the remainder of the term of the then

existing Parliament.

If a majority of those voting record their votes in favour of the proposal, then the Speakers of both Houses shall give authority for the sale of wine, beer, and spirituous liquors till the close of the last session of the then existing Parliament.

In case of equality of votes, the Clerk of the Legislative Council

shall have a casting-vote.

A poll as aforesaid shall also be taken on the first day of the meeting of every ensuing Parliament.

Subsection five of clause three of "The Licensing Act, 1881," is

hereby repealed.
