

THE PHARMACY BURSARIES REGULATIONS 1972, AMENDMENT NO. 2

ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government House at Wellington this 15th day of July 1974

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Education Act 1964, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

REGULATIONS

1. Title and commencement—(1) These regulations may be cited as the Pharmacy Bursaries Regulations 1972, Amendment No. 2, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Pharmacy Bursaries Regulations 1972* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

(2) These regulations shall come into force on the day after the date

of their notification in the Gazette.

2. Interpretation—Regulation 2 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by omitting from the definition of the expression "tuition fees" the words "nine-tenths of".

3. Qualification for fees bursary—Regulation 13 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by inserting, after subclause (4), the

following subclause—

"(4A) The Director-General may also award a fees bursary to any person who has been awarded a New Zealand Certificate in Science in recognition of his having successfully completed a course for the certificate prescribed under the Technicians Certification Act 1958, whether or not that person has, before being awarded the certificate, held a bursary which was terminated under regulation 31 of these regulations."

4. Qualification for fees and allowances bursary—(1) Regulation 14 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by inserting in paragraph (c) of subclause (1), after the words "New Zealand Certificate", the words "in Science", and also by inserting, after the words "completed

a course", the words "for the certificate".

(2) The said regulation 14 is hereby further amended by adding to subclause (2) the words "unless the person has in a year earlier than that in which he has been granted the Higher School Certificate qualified academically for entrance to a university in terms of requirements prescribed by the Universities Entrance Board or the Senate of the University of New Zealand."

- 5. Limited full-time courses—Regulation 16 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by inserting in paragraph (c) of subclause (3), after the words "regulations or under", the words "paragraph (c) or".
- 6. Tenure of bursaries—Regulation 17 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by omitting from subclause (1) the words "full-time instruction in".
- 7. Value of fees and allowances bursary—(1) Regulation 19 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by revoking paragraphs (a) to (c) of subclause (1), and substituting the following paragraphs:

(a) \$180 in the first year of the bursary:

- "(b) \$225 in the second year of the bursary: "(c) \$270 in the third year of the bursary:
- "(d) \$315 in the fourth year of the bursary: "(e) \$360 in the fifth year of the bursary:
- "(f) \$405 in the sixth year of the bursary and in any subsequent year of the bursary."

(2) The said regulation 19 is hereby further amended by adding the

following subclause-

- "(3) The holder of a fees and allowances bursary shall not in any year proceed to the higher step on the scale of allowances appropriate to the year of his bursary unless in the immediately preceding year of his study he has passed in each of the subjects or units which constitute a full-time course. In any other case where a fees and allowances bursary is continued the allowance shall be at the rate which the bursar last received."
- (3) The said regulation 19 is hereby further amended, consequentially, by inserting in subclause (1), before the words "The maximum annual value", the words "Subject to subclause (3) of this regulation,".
- 8. Supplementary allowances—(1) Regulation 32 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by omitting from subclause (2) the expression "\$100", and substituting the expression "\$150".

(2) The said regulation 32 is hereby further amended by omitting from subclause (3) the expression "\$60", and substituting the expression "\$100".

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.

These regulations amend the Pharmacy Bursaries Regulations 1972.

The main effect is that-

- (a) All tuition fees, instead of only nine-tenths as at present, will be paid by means of each fees, and fees and allowances bursary:
 (b) A fees and allowances bursary at present payable to the holder of any
- (b) A fees and allowances bursary at present payable to the holder of any New Zealand Certificate will be payable only if that certificate is in science:
- (c) A fees bursary will be payable to the holder of a New Zealand Certificate in Science:
- (d) A fees and allowances bursary is no longer payable by virtue of a person having been granted a Higher School Certificate unless the person qualified academically for entrance to a university in a year earlier than that in which he was granted the certificate:

(c) A student pursuing a limited full-time course will not now be eligible to be paid a supplementary allowance on account of the merit of his passes:

(f) The value of the fees and allowances bursary has been increased to the same amount as the bursaries payable under the University Bursaries Regulations 1971, but a student cannot progress to a higher step on the scale of allowances unless in the previous year he has passed all the subjects or units which constitute a full-time course:

(g) Supplementary allowances generally are increased from \$100 to \$150, and a person qualified under regulation 32 (3) of the principal regulations to receive a supplementary allowance of \$60 will now instead receive a supplementary allowance of \$100.
