THE PROHIBITED MARKS ORDER 1957

ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government House at Wellington this 28th day of August 1957

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE ADMINISTRATOR OF THE GOVERNMENT IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Trade Marks Act 1953, His Excellency the Administrator of the Government, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following order.

ORDER

1. This order may be cited as the Prohibited Marks Order 1957.

2. The "Green Cross for Safety" symbol of the National Safety Association of New Zealand (Incorporated), being a green cross in a green circle with the words "Green Cross for Safety" printed in the circle, is hereby declared to be a prohibited mark within the meaning of paragraph (j) of subsection (1) of section 21 of the Trade Marks Act 1953.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the order, but is intended to indicate its general effect.

This order declares that the "Green Cross for Safety" symbol of the National Safety Association of New Zealand (Incorporated) shall be a prohibited mark within the meaning of section 21 (1) (j) of the Trade Marks Act 1953. In consequence it will not be lawful without the consent of Her Majesty or of the Governor-General to register a trade mark which contains that symbol or any mark so nearly resembling that symbol as to be likely to deceive.
