THE PROHIBITED MARKS ORDER 1982

ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government House at Wellington this 31st day of May 1982

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to section 21 of the Trade Marks Act 1953, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following order.

ORDER

1. Title and commencement—(1) This order may be cited as the Prohibited Marks Order 1982.

(2) This order shall come into force on the day after the date of its notification in the *Gazette*.

2. “TELARC”—The mark “TELARC” is hereby declared to be a prohibited mark for the purposes of section 21 of the Trade Marks Act 1953.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This note is not part of the order, but is intended to indicate its general effect.

This order declares that the mark "TELARC", which is an abbreviation of the words "Testing Laboratory Registration Council" (that Council being established under the Testing Laboratory Registration Act 1972), shall be a prohibited mark for the purposes of section 21 of the Trade Marks Act 1953. The effect of the order is that it will not be lawful without the authority of Her Majesty or the Governor-General to register that mark as a trade mark or any mark so nearly resembling that mark as to be likely to deceive.
