



## THE TELEPHONE REGULATIONS 1976, AMENDMENT NO. 2

## ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government Buildings at Wellington this 13th day of March 1978

Present:

THE RIGHT HON. R. D. MULDOON PRESIDING IN COUNCIL

PURSUANT to the Post Office Act 1959, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following regulations.

## REGULATIONS

**1. Title and commencement**—(1) These regulations may be cited as the Telephone Regulations 1976, Amendment No. 2, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Telephone Regulations 1976\* (hereinafter referred to as the principal regulations).

(2) These regulations shall come into force on the day after the date of their notification in the *Gazette*.

**2. Minister may discontinue telephone service**—Regulation 64 of the principal regulations is hereby amended by adding, after paragraph (c), the following paragraph:

“(d) If in the opinion of the Minister any wilful activity by a subscriber so affects the telephone system that the use of the system by other people is seriously inhibited.”

**EXPLANATORY NOTE**

*This note is not part of the regulations, but is intended to indicate their general effect.*

This amendment empowers the Minister to discontinue the telephone service of any subscriber whose wilful activity seriously inhibits the use of the telephone system by other people.
