

(11.) AUCKLAND TAILORESSES.

THIS agreement made in pursuance of "The Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act, 1894," and amendments thereof, this 1st day of May, 1899, between Rebecca Jordan, John Manners Morran, A. Clark and Sons (Limited), George H. Powley, H. H. Seabrook, R. A. Greer, Arthur W. Smith, Joseph Ehrmann, F. S. Lumsden, L. and C. Davey, manufacturers, all of Auckland, New Zealand (hereinafter called "the employers"), of the one part, and the Auckland Tailoresses' Industrial Union of Workers at Auckland, New Zealand (hereinafter called "the union"), of the other part.

WHEREAS an industrial dispute has arisen within the meaning of "The Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act, 1894," and amendments, and such industrial dispute was referred for settlement to the manufacturers on the one part and the representatives of the union on the other part: And whereas terms of settlement were agreed upon between the parties and approved of, and such terms of settlement are as hereafter appears: Now this agreement witnesseth—

1. Hereunto annexed, and marked with the letters "A" and "B" respectively, are the shirt and clothing logs referred to in the terms of settlement as hereinafter set forth.

2. The parties hereto shall faithfully abide by and perform the terms of settlement arrived at between the parties as follows:—

(a.) At the end of section "Slop trousers" (machining) the following words to be added: "All trousers given to machinists without pockets and band-linings being made, $\frac{1}{4}$ d. extra each pair."

(b.) American Denims: The words "five pockets" to be added.

(c.) Denim trousers: Three pockets and patch watch-pocket, 5d.

(d.) In section "Slop trousers" (machining) the following words to be added after seventh line: "Bound-top trousers to be 3s. 3d."

(e.) In section "Slop trousers" (machining) the following to be added: "Bands bound separately 6d. per dozen, with loops 9d. per dozen."

(f.) In section "Slop trousers" (machining) the price of boys' K.B. trousers to read " $2\frac{1}{4}$ d."

(g.) In section "Slop vests" (finishing) the prices to read as follows:—

The above-named firms and the Auckland Tailoresses' Union of Workers to be bound by the terms and conditions of the agreement: Provided that if any other person or firm, in conducting their busi-

ness, shall not conform to such terms and conditions, the union shall take the necessary steps to compel them to do so within fourteen days after notice from any employer or employers, and if the union fail to commence and carry out proceedings, or if in taking such proceedings it shall be unable to compel such persons or firms to conform to the terms, then the parties to this agreement shall be released from it.

3. The employers in employing labour shall not discriminate against members of the union. The employers shall not, in the engagement or dismissal of hands, do anything directly or indirectly for the purpose of injuring the union.

4. This agreement shall be an "industrial agreement" within the meaning of the said Act.

5. This agreement shall operate and take effect from the 1st day of May, 1899, and shall continue until the 1st day of May, 1900.
