- (2357.) NEW ZEALAND FEDERATED TAILORESSES.—ORDER OF THE COURT BRINGING INTO OPERATION THE PROVISIONS OF SCHEDULE B OF THE AWARD.
- In the Court of Arbitration of New Zealand, Otago and Southland Industrial District.—In the matter of the Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act, 1908, and its amendments; and in the matter of an award made on the 28th day of May, 1909, in an industrial dispute between the New Zealand Federated Tailoresses' Industrial Union of Workers and the New Zealand Clothing-manufacturers' Industrial Union of Employers.

Friday, the 30th day of June, 1911.

Upon the application of the above-named union, this Court doth order that the provisions contained in Schedule B to the said award shall be and the same are hereby brought into force in the Northern, Wellington, Canterbury, and Otago and Southland Industrial Districts as from the 17th day of July, 1911; and this Court doth further order that a duplicate of this order shall be filed forthwith in the office of the Clerk of Awards in Auckland, Wellington, and Christchurch.

MEMORANDUM.

The above-mentioned award was originally in force in the Wellington, Canterbury, and Otago and Southland Districts only. (Book of Awards, Vol. x, p. 243, 250). It was extended afterwards to the Northern District, with certain modifications (Book of

Awards, Vol. xi, p. 356).

The employers' union having cancelled its registration, and the new union of employers not having been registered yet, it was impossible to give notice of the application for the present order to any party named in the award. Notice thereof was given, however, to the employers in Dunedin, Christchurch, and Wellington who had been members of the employers' union. Some of the employers in Christchurch objected to the application, but the grounds put forward by them did not appear to the Court to afford any reason for refusing to make the order asked for. The employers in Auckland, Wellington, and Dunedin did not object to the application.
