
(5367.) NEW ZEALAND FEDERATED TAILORESSES AND OTHER
CLOTHING TRADE EMPLOYEES.—ORDER ADDING PARTIES TO
AWARD.

In the Court of Arbitration of New Zealand, Otago and Southland
Industrial District.—In the matter of the Industrial Concilia-
tion and Arbitration Act, 1908, and its amendments; and in
