(10137.) NEW ZEALAND (EXCEPT STEWART ISLAND) PRIVATE-HOTELS EMPLOYEES.—STRIKING OUT PARTY FROM AWARD.

MEMORANDUM.

On an application to strike out the name of Mrs. Tiller it was not proved that the citation had been delivered to her personally or to any person authorized by her to receive it. The signature which appears on the registered-letter receipt is not that of any lodger or member of the staff of Croydon House. Mrs. Tiller has definitely sworn that the citation did not come to her notice, and that she was absent from Wellington on the date on which the citation was signed for. In the circumstances the Court is bound to hold that she was not duly served with the proceedings. Her name is accordingly struck out as from the date of the coming into force of the award.
