

(10381.) NORTHERN INDUSTRIAL DISTRICT SADDLERS AND HARNESS AND BAG MAKERS.—SUPPLEMENTARY AGREEMENT.

THIS industrial agreement, made in pursuance of the Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act, 1925, and its amendments, this 25th day of January, 1933, between the assessors appointed for the hearing of the industrial dispute between the Auckland Saddlers, Harnessmakers, Collarmakers, Bagmakers, and Bridle-cutters' Society Industrial Union of Workers (hereinafter called "the union") of the one part, and Messrs. W. B. Darlow, Auckland, Palmer, Collins, and Whitaker, Ltd., Auckland, and others whose names appear on the schedule hereunto annexed and marked "A" (hereinafter called "the employers") of the other part, whereby it is mutually agreed by and between the said assessors as set out in the schedule hereto, as follows, that is to say:—

SCHEDULE.

It is agreed that the industrial agreement made between the union and the employers, and dated the 30th day of November, 1932, shall be varied in the manner following, that is to say:—

(i) A new clause, to be numbered 7 (b) as hereunder set out, shall be added to the aforesaid industrial agreement, as follows:—

"7. (b) An employer shall be entitled to make a rateable deduction from the wages of a worker for all time lost by her through sickness,

accident, default, voluntary absence from work with the consent of the employer, or for any time during which the factory is closed for the purpose of cleaning or repairing the machinery.”

(ii) This agreement shall come into force as from the date hereof, and shall continue in force until the 8th day of December, 1934.
