WELLINGTON, NELSON, WESTLAND, AND CANTERBURY

In the Court of Arbitration of New Zealand.—In the matter of the Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act, 1925, and the Economic Stabilization Emergency Regulations 1942; and in the matter of the Wellington, Nelson, Westland, and Canterbury Coachworkers' award, dated the 22nd day of February, 1946, and recorded in 46 Book of Awards 33.

In pursuance and exercise of the powers vested in it by the Economic Stabilization Emergency Regulations 1942, and of every other power in that behalf thereunto enabling it, this Court, for the purpose of giving effect to the pronouncement made by it on the 15th day of August, 1947, doth hereby order as follows:—

- 1. That the said award shall be amended in the manner following:
- (1) By deleting subclauses (a), (b), and (f) of clause 3 (Wages), and substituting therefor the following subclauses:—
 - "(a) The following shall be the minimum rates of wages:-
