"(b) A worker employed as a hand-washerwoman shall be paid a minimum wage of £4 3s. 5d. per week."

"(f) A 'casual' is a worker (other than a washerwoman engaged by the day) who is employed for less than a week. 'Casuals' shall be paid a rate equal to one-third more than the appropriate weekly rate. A casual hand-washerwoman shall be paid 18s. 3d. per day."

(2) By deleting clause 17 (Increase in Rates of Remuneration).
