WELLINGTON CITY COUNCIL (MILK DEPARTMENT) EMPLOYEES.—AMENDMENT OF AWARD

In the Court of Arbitration of New Zealand.—In the matter of the Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act, 1925, and the Economic Stabilization Emergency Regulations 1942; and in the matter of the Wellington City Council (Milk Department) Employees' award, dated the 16th day of December, 1946, and recorded in 46 Book of Awards 1940.

In pursuance and exercise of the powers vested in it by the Economic Stabilization Emergency Regulations 1942, and of every other power in that behalf thereunto enabling it, this Court, for the purpose of giving effect to the pronouncement made by it on the 15th day of August, 1947, doth hereby order as follows:—

- 1. That the said award shall be amended in the manner following:—
- (1) By deleting subclauses (a) and (b) of clause 2 (Wages), and substituting therefor the following subclauses:—
 - "(a) Depot hands: £6 3s. 2d. per week.
 - "(b) Roundsmen: £6 14s. 9d. per week.
 - "Motor-drivers: £7 1s. per week,

which rates include 6s. per week as recompense for the continuance of the present arrangement of an early starting-time, and also include part payment for Sunday work; in addition, there shall be added thereto a further 4s. to cover Sunday work."

(2) By deleting clause 3, and substituting therefor the following clause:—

" Casual Workers

- "3. A casual worker is a worker who is employed for a period of less than one week. Every such worker shall be paid 3s. 3d. per hour, with a minimum of one day's pay."
- (3) By deleting clause 9 (Increase in Rates of Remuneration).
- 2. That this order shall be deemed to have come into force on the 1st day of October, 1947.
