

OTAGO AND SOUTHLAND BRICK, TILE, POTTERY, CLAY-PIPE, AND CONCRETE-GOODS MAKERS—AMENDMENT OF AWARD

In the Court of Arbitration of New Zealand.—In the matter of the Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act, 1925, and the Economic Stabilization, Emergency Regulations, 1942; and in the matter of the Otago and Southland Brick, Tile, Pottery, Clay-pipe, and Concrete-goods makers' award, dated the 10th day of December, 1948, and recorded in 48 Book of Awards 2241.

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers vested in it by the Economic Stabilization Emergency Regulations, 1942, and of every other power in that behalf thereunto enabling it, this Court, for the purpose of giving effect to the pronouncement made by it on the 12th day of April, 1949, doth hereby order as follows:—

1. That the said award shall be amended in the manner following:—

(1) By deleting subclauses (a), (b), (d), and (e) of clause 5 (Wages) and substituting therefor the following subclauses:—

“ Thereafter, or on attaining the age of twenty-one years, not less than £4 10s. 9d. per week.”
