

**CANTERBURY HOUSEHOLD WOODWARE, WOODEN TOYS, AND
NOVELTY MAKERS—AMENDMENT OF AWARD**

In the Court of Arbitration of New Zealand.—In the matter of the Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act, 1925, and the Economic Stabilization Emergency Regulations 1942; and in the matter of the Canterbury Household Woodware, Wooden Toys, and Novelty Makers' award, dated the 26th day of June, 1945, and recorded in 45 Book of Awards 755.

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers vested in it by the Economic Stabilization Emergency Regulations 1942, and of every other power in that behalf thereunto enabling it, this Court, for the purpose of giving effect to the pronouncement made by it on the 12th day of April, 1949, doth hereby order as follows:—

1. That the said award (as amended by order of the Court dated the 26th day of August, 1947) shall be further amended by deleting clause 4 and substituting therefor the following clause:—

“Wages

“4. (a) *Female Workers*.—Females engaged in operating shapers, planers, band-saws, circular saws, and lathes (other than automatic lathes):—

“ Thereafter six-monthly increases of 10s. per week until the age of twenty-one years is reached, provided that the adult rate is not thereby exceeded.

“ Thereafter, £4 5s. 6d. per week: Provided that any worker of the age of twenty-one years or upwards shall not be paid less than the basic wage for the time being in force.

“ Thereafter, six-monthly increases of 10s. per week until the age of twenty-one years is reached, when the adult rate shall be paid.

“(e) *Woodworking Machinists* (male) £7 12s. 8d. per week.

“ For the purposes of this award, ‘woodworking machinist’ shall mean a man who is competent to set up and keep in good running-order a machine to sharpen the knives and cutters and who actually performs the work of setting up and operating such machine.

“(f) Other adult male workers, £6 16s. 11d. per week.

“(g) Nothing in this award shall operate to reduce the present rates of wages paid to any worker now employed.

“(h) Wages shall be paid weekly not later than Thursday on the premises of the employer and during working-hours.

“(i) The present practice in regard to the proportion of junior workers to adults shall continue while this award is in force.”

2. That this order shall come into force on the 1st day of June, 1949.
