

WELLINGTON AND CANTERBURY PRINTERS' INK, DRAWING-CHALK, AND CRAYON
MANUFACTURERS' EMPLOYEES—AMENDMENT OF AWARD

In the Court of Arbitration of New Zealand.—In the matter of the Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act, 1925, and the Economic Stabilization Regulations 1952; and in the matter of the Wellington and Canterbury Printers' Ink, Drawing-chalk, and Crayon Manufacturers' Employees award, dated the 25th day of July 1951, and recorded in 51 Book of Awards 1364.

In pursuance and exercise of the powers vested in it by the Economic Stabilization Regulations 1952, and of every other power in that behalf thereunto enabling it, this Court for the purpose of giving effect to the pronouncement made by it on the 12th day of July 1952, doth hereby order as follows:—

1. That the said award shall be amended in the manner following:—

(1) By deleting clauses 4 and 5 and substituting the following clauses:—

“ 5. (a) All casual workers shall be paid at the rate of not less than 4s. 5½d. per hour with a minimum of four hours.

“ (b) A ‘ casual ’ shall mean a person whose engagement is for a period of less than five consecutive days.”

(2) By deleting clause 6 (Increase in Rates of Remuneration).

(3) By deleting from the undermentioned clauses the figures and symbols set out in the first column hereunder and substituting in each case the figures and symbols respectively set out in the second column hereunder :—
