

NEW ZEALAND COACH AND MOTOR-BODY BUILDING INDUSTRY—
AMENDMENT OF APPRENTICESHIP ORDER

In the Court of Arbitration of New Zealand—In the matter of the Apprentices Act 1948; and in the matter of the New Zealand Coach and Motor-body Building Industry Apprenticeship Order, dated the 11th day of April 1962, and recorded in 62 Book of Awards 465.

WHEREAS by section 13 (2) of the Apprentices Act 1948, the Court is empowered to amend any apprenticeship order: And whereas application has been made to the Court by the New Zealand Coachbuilding Apprenticeship Committee for amendment of the New Zealand Coach and Motor-body Building Industry Apprenticeship Order, dated the 11th day of April 1962, and recorded in 62 Book of Awards 465: And whereas the Court has considered the recommendations made to it by the said Committee and has heard the employers, workers, and other persons concerned: Now therefore, the Court, in pursuance and exercise of the powers vested in it by the said Act, doth hereby order as follows:

1. That the said apprenticeship order shall be amended in the manner following:

(1) By deleting subclause (b) of clause 10 (Proportion) and substituting the following subclause:

“(b) In all branches apprentices may be taken on to replace apprentices who have completed 8,000 hours of their apprenticeship, and an apprentice who has served not less than 8,000 hours shall be reckoned neither as an apprentice nor as a journeyman for the purposes of proportion.”

(2) By deleting from the schedule to the order the operations and skills for “Coach-painting” and substituting the following:

“Coachpainting”

1. (a) Care, use, and routine maintenance of tools, spray guns, and related trade equipment.

(b) Safety and health precautions including resuscitation.

(c) Personal cleanliness.

2. (a) Use, maintenance and selection of tools and materials normally used in this branch of the industry.

(b) Basic knowledge of colour strengths as applied to matching and blending.

3. (a) The removal, storage and care of all accessories.

(b) The washing, stripping, masking, priming, rubbing down and blowing off.

(c) The filling and preparation for applications of the finishing coat.

4. (a) The offsetting of the effects of waxes, silicones or other polishing treatments on surfaces.

(b) Rust prevention and treatment methods.

(c) Use and after treatment of paint strippers.

5. (a) Colour matching.

(b) Use and care of lining brushes and normal brush work.

6. Spraying techniques in relation to enamels and lacquers whether hot or cold processes are used.

7. (a) Complete repaint and extensive touch up work including interior finish.

(b) Polishing of interior woodwork.”

2. That this order shall operate and take effect as from the day of the date hereof.
