168	Lace, laces, and ribbons, n.e.i.
180(1)	Textile piece-goods of cotton, linen, jute, hemp, other vegetable fibre, silk, imitation silk, artificial silk, or of combinations of these materials with one another, or with any other material (except wool or hair), (other than knitted or lock-stitched piece-goods of silk, or artificial silk, or of combinations of these materials with one another, or with any other materials (except wool or hair), whether plain, hemmed, whipped, or similarly worked, and plain tablecloths, table napkins, towels, quilts, sheets, and similar plain articles, which have been manufactured wholly from such piece-goods merely by cutting, hemming, or any similar operation
