The Foodstuffs Emergency Regulations 1939.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

PURSUANT to the Public Safety Conservation Act, 1932, there being a Proclamation of Emergency now in force under that Act, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby make the following regulations.

REGULATIONS.

REGULATION 1.-PRELIMINARY.

(1) These regulations may be cited as the Foodstuffs Emergency Regulations 1939.

(2) These regulations shall be read together with and deemed part of the Supply Control Emergency Regulations 1939.

- (3) In these regulations, unless inconsistent with the context,-
 - "Foodstuffs" means every article which is used for food or drink by man or which enters into or is used in the composition or preparation of any such article; and includes tobacco and cigarettes; but does not include sugar, wheat, wheaten flour, bran, pollard, or bread:
 - "Controller" means the Food Controller appointed under these regulations; and includes any person for the time being authorized to exercise or perform any of the Controller's powers or functions:
 - "Sale" includes every form of disposition (whether for valuable consideration or otherwise); and includes a contract for sale:
 - "Trader," in relation to foodstuffs, means any person who for the purpose of any trade or business carried on by him (whether as a producer, manufacturer, merchant, broker, warehouseman, importer, or otherwise) holds from time to time a stock of foodstuffs.

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
