The Canister Workers Employees' Labour Legislation Suspension Order 1944

N pursuance of the Labour Legislation Emergency Regulations 1940, the Minister of Labour doth hereby order as follows:

1. This Order may be cited as the Canister Workers Employees Labour Legislation Suspension Order 1944.

- 2. This Order applies to Alexander Harvey and Sons (Wellington), Ltd., and to the workers who are employed by the company and whose employment is subject to the provisions of the New Zealand Metal Trades' Employees' award dated the 30th day of June, 1941,
- and recorded in 41 Book of Awards 655. 3. The provisions of all Acts and regulations thereunder and of the said award are hereby suspended in so far as any such provisions operate to prevent the workers referred to in clause 2 hereof from being employed on the terms and conditions herein set forth.
- 4. Females eighteen years of age and over may be employed as casual workers during the hours from 5.30 p.m. to 9.30 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday in each week.
- 5. For all time worked during the hours mentioned in the preceding clause the workers shall be paid 2s. 6d. per hour, inclusive of increases granted by the Court of Arbitration in pursuance of the Rates of Wages Emergency Regulations 1940.
- 6. This Order shall come into effect on and from the day of the date hereof.

The Shops and Offices Act, 1921–22, and its Amendments.— Fixing the Closing-hours of Chemists' Shops within the Combined District of Dunedin

WHEREAS a requisition in writing, signed by a majority of the occupiers of all the chemists' shops within the Combined District of Dunedin, comprising the City of Dunedin and the boroughs of St. Kilda, Port Chalmers, West Harbour, and Green Island, has been forwarded to me, desiring that all such shops within the said combined district, save and except the shop (hereinafter referred to as "the exempted shop") established at 55 Moray Place, within the City of Dunedin, for the purpose only of the sale of medicines and surgical appliances that are urgently required, and known as the "Associated Chemists, Limited," be closed as set out below, and that subsection (4) of section 35 of the Shops and Offices Act, 1921–22, should not apply to any shop within two miles and a half of the exempted shop while medicines and surgical appliances are obtainable from the exempted shop: On Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays at 5.30 p.m., on Fridays at 9 p.m., and on Sundays for the whole of the day, with the following exceptions: (1) On the working-day that first precedes Christmas Day and on the working-day that first precedes New Year's Day, the closing-hour shall be 11 p.m.; (2) on the working-day that first precedes New Year's Day, the closing-hour shall be 11 p.m.; (2) on the working-day that first precedes New Year's Day, the closing-hour shall be 11 p.m.; (2) on the working-day that first precedes New Year's Day, the closing-hour shall be 13 p.m.; And whereas the Minister of Labour is satisfied that the signatures to such requisition represent a majority of the occupiers of all the said shops within the said combined district, and that all the occupiers of the said shops within the said combined district affected by section 35 (1) of the said Act have been afforded an equal right to share at a reasonable cost in the profits of the business carried on by the exempted shop:

## Notes

(1) Pursuant to section 21 (e) of the Shops and Offices Act, 1921–22, a chemist may keep his shop open (but only for the supply of medicines and surgical appliances) between the hours of 7 p.m. and 9 p.m. on the statutory closing-day.

(2) Pursuant to section 35 (4) of the Shops and Offices Act, 1921–22, a chemist in the combined district whose shop is more than two miles and a half from the exempted shop may supply medicines and surgical appliances that are urgently required on Sundays and on working-days outside the hours specified above: Provided that the shop is opened for such purpose only and is closed immediately the sale is effected, and that the door of the shop is kept locked except for the admission and exit of the customer.
