With respect to goods of the kinds specified in the Schedule to the notice that Tribunal advises that application for its approval of proposed prices should be made to the Tribunal as soon as possible, and draws attention of all persons concerned to the fact that, at any time after the expiration of four weeks from the publication of the notice, it may proceed, in accordance with the powers conferred on it by the regulations, to prohibit the sale of any such goods otherwise than at prices fixed or approved by the Tribunal.

THE following estimated average yields per acre of wheat,
oats, and barley for the season 1943-44 have been compiled
from reports furnished by Stock Inspectors of the Department of
Agriculture throughout the Dominion, and are now published for general information.

The above estimates may be compared with last season's actual average yields, which were: Wheat, 34.21 bushels; oats, 49.90 bushels; and barley, 36.91 bushels.

In accordance with the above estimates, the total yield of wheat for the season 1943-44 should be approximately 7,700,000 bushels, as against an ascertained yield of 9,819,342 bushels for the season 1942-43.

The area from which oats were threshed for the five season's ending with 1942-43 averaged 22 per cent. of the total area under that crop. Assuming that a similar proportion is threshed this year, the total yield of grain would be approximately 2,100,000 bushels, as against a yield of 2,808,774 bushels for the season 1942-43.

On a similar assumption in regard to barley, the total yield of grain would be approximately 1,120,000 bushels, as against 1,057,608 bushels for the season 1942-43.
